### Sudbury Council 267

New GK reflects on family tradition in Sudbury. from Bro Francis Waddington (pictured)

Opening the latest copy of our Provincial Directory, and glancing over the list of the Council Officers, I found it hard to believe that I was actually in office as Grand Knight of Council 267 – Sudbury. This was on



two counts, firstly that I only attained full Knighthood in 2016, and secondly, the rather underwhelming experience of not actually having been installed at a Council meeting!

However, I do have a sense of pride in my family connection with our Council. Sudbury Council 267 was erected in 1933, and our Charter is on the wall of the Russell Room of our Parish Centre at St. George's. The Room is named after our founding parish priest and chaplain, Fr. Clement Russell.

Another Founder-member's name on the Charter is that of Frank Lickert, (pictured) my late grandfather. He gave many years of service to the parish, being a



recipient of the Bene Merenti Medal in 1971, and also held office of Grand Knight. My other grandfather, Francis Foakes joined the Council on moving to Sudbury, but sadly died shortly afterwards in 1952. My late father, Leslie Waddington, similarly joined the Knights in the 1950s, was on the Action Committee, and was awarded the Order's Golden Jubilee Medal in 2002. I have not mentioned a couple of uncles, Peter Fowler and John Weir who were Brothers in our Council.

Parish life was different then - families lived a lot closer together then, practically walking distance. Although being brought up in Sudbury, work took me away from the area in 1987, and after living in Brighton and Southampton, home beckoned in 2011 when I needed to support my late mother. I have always What strikes me is the loyalty of the Brothers in our Council, where several have moved well outside the boundaries of our parish, yet practice faith in our Parish and regularly attend our meetings.

During the time of the coronavirus, we continue to pray for and support each other, and look forward to the day when we can meet in Council again.

### 24 Hours Adoration

Two-and-half-years ago my wife and I approached our parish priest with an idea to have 24 hours of Adoration once a month, from Friday morning until Saturday morning in St Edmund's church, Whitton. The idea was agreed and launched inviting parishioners to volunteer to take an hourly slot.

Our Council 970 readily voted to support this new parish prayer initiative with many brothers signing up for an hour, or more, of Adoration. About a year ago I then read an article in *The Columba* calling all Knights and Councils to pray, ideally in front of the Blessed Sacrament, for the protection of unborn children as part of the co-ordinated SPUC and KSC initiative. Since the monthly 24 hours of Adoration was already well established in the parish, the KSC S&W officer brother Tom Blake, and his wife Helen, decided to lead the rosary at 8pm on Friday evening dedicated to the protection of the unborn child.

24 hours of Adoration, silent prayer and reflection in front of the Blessed Sacrament, is now well into its third year and continues to enrich the parish spiritual and prayer life. The rota is well supported with parishioners of all ages volunteering for regular time slots by signing up well in



advance. There are also times when the 'regulars' have been unavailable, away on holiday for example, but these have been successfully managed with other volunteers filling in. A couple of months have had to be postponed, due to bad weather in the winter or the holiday season in August, but these absent months were missed as Adoration has become an established feature in the parish monthly calendar. There have been a few more additions, praise and worship on Friday night for example, but mainly the hour is spent in prayerful silence and devotion to Jesus.

Finally, the overall benefit of Adoration is that it allows a space for parishioners to stop and be still in the presence of God, especially in our busy noisy world, bringing us back to heart of what we believe as Catholics, that Jesus is truly present in the Most Holy Eucharist. ®

With the closing of churches due to the Pandemic, one would think that people will be left without the grace of going to Mass every day or whenever possible. Many can say that morning or even evening



mass times did not work well with their working hours and one would understand.

Many parishioners would normally go to Mass during the weekend each week to fulfil their obligations. Indeed the numbers of Catholics are often judged by the number of people attending weekend masses. Especially with most senior citizens, many do not associate technology and the world wide web with their devotions, more the opposite. It is a fact that the www is more renowned for pornography and other extreme and profane areas, which at times one finds views that pop-up on the screen without them having been looked for.

However, every sad aspect of the web is these days being challenged by subjects that are completely the opposite. Many catholic organisations have their own websites that spread the good message of Christ. There are some that just publish specific prayers, some that explore aspects of the Bible, some that invite youngsters to get involved in developing their faith, so the web is not all bad, and if anything I find it a gift and a big benefit both to my faith and beliefs.

For those who are very involved in their parish, buying nice things for their church has become not just easy, but affords a wide variety of nice vestments, statues, repository items and even sanctuary items for the priest to use at Mass. I for one have found good retail suppliers in Poland, Spain and Portugal which I used in the last year or so.

For those who are responsible for sacristy logistics, altar wine, candles, hosts, incense etc., one finds that not only is there a lot of choices on the internet, but one can compare prices and often increase purchasing power and costs benefits.



But the reason I decided to write a few lines is to bring to every one's notice the services that are now available on the Net. There are a great choice of Masses – every day – at all the hours of the morning and evening. The thing I find really good that I and my wife can go to Mass every day and at a different church every day if we wished to. There are some fantastically lovely churches in England and Ireland, chapels, parish churches, oratories, cathedrals, basilicas, you name it, it's there for you to go to Mass at.

Apart from the church's building and sanctuaries, the other thing I really enjoy is the priest saying Mass. Some just run through the service in close to twenty minutes, some others have their own style. [I came across one priest in Ireland that took his guitar to the lectern and at the chosen time played and sung to his own hymn!].

I really enjoy some of the homilies, many of them are very enlightening, others like the Polish Priest at St Gregory the Great, South Ruislip who gives a great homily and relates to the missing congregation as if it was a full church. Another priest who excused himself for interrupting the service to go to the sacristy and adjust the volume!

Apart for a great choice in Mass services, there is also online Stations of the Cross. The one I really like is the Holy Rosary. Here again is a great choice in style and prayers, some with hymns. I



find it useful that following the Mass service I go straight to the Rosary section and pray the rosary and one usually can do both in one hour, not much to offer God especially these days of extreme virus infections and deaths, and especially when one has not got that much to do all day in self isolation.
