

SUPREME COUNCIL LIVERPOOL OCTOBER 2021

The 98th Supreme Council Meeting was held at Liverpool, based at the Liner Hotel in Lord Nelson Street; and needless to say, the Hotel was designed and built like the innards of a Luxury Cruise ship. The setting was perfect for our meeting. Every Province was properly spaced out and labelled, to comply with the requirements of Covid-19.

The Meeting started on time, with the procession of the Clergy and Irish contingent, consisting of the Supreme Knight Brother Brendon McCann and his Deputy Supreme Knight, of the Knights of St Columbanus, led by a drummer. The Supreme Knight Brother Bertie, Welcomed the brothers of the Order and invited us to take our seats.

The meeting started with the usual ritual. The Directors presented their Reports, after which nominations were taken, and we voted to replace or retain the current Director. Matters arising from the reports were discussed, and after a two-hour session we stopped for lunch.

We had a three-course dinner and a short break. The meeting resumed, and awards were made before tea.



Assisted dying....

f Earlier this year an 'Assisted Dying' Bill was introduced in the House of Lords by Baroness Meacher. It received its Second Reading, with full debate, on Friday 22nd October 2021. It aims to legalise assisted suicide in England and Wales. If successful it will permit a terminally adult who has less than 6 months to live, to be helped to commit



We need to redouble our prayers, advocacy and action to thwart Baroness Meacher's 'Assisted Dying Bill 2021' which came before the House of Lords for its second reading and debate on 15th October, and as we go to press, the bill now goes into Committee Stage in the House of Commons. Vatican City, Oct 10, 2021 / 09:04 am

It is interesting that in her appearances at Lourdes, Fatima and other locations, the Mother of God repeatedly recommends praying the Rosary. She does not invite us to pray the Divine Office, or to do spiritual reading, or Eucharistic Adoration, or practice interior prayer or mental prayer. All the mentioned forms of prayer are good, recognized by the Church and practiced by many saints. Why does Mary "only" place the Rosary in our hearts?

We can find a possible answer by looking at the visionaries of Lourdes and Fatima. Mary revealed herself to children of little instruction, who could not even read or write correctly. The Rosary was for them the appropriate school to learn how to pray well, since bead after bead, it leads us from vocal prayer, to meditation, and eventually to contemplation. With the Rosary, everyone who allows him/herself to be led by Mary can arrive at interior prayer without any kind of special technique or complicated practices.

This does not mean – and I want to emphasize this point - that praying the Rosary is for "dummies" or for simple minded people. Even great intellectuals must comé before God as children, who in their prayers are always simple and sincere, always full of confidence, praying from within.

All Christians are called to the kind of interior prayer that allows an experience of closeness with God and recognition of his action in our lives. We can compare the Rosary to playing the guitar. The vocal prayers – the Our Father, the Hail Mary and the Glory Be – are the central prayers of Christianity, rooted in Scripture. These are like the rhythm in a song. •



The Climate crisis, an accelerating ecological instability, resulting in the loss of habitats, homes for millions of species, including humans, continually at risk from climate conflict, and ensuing damage.

Pope Francis invited us to "Work with generosity and tenderness in protecting this world which God has entrusted to us" and together, we pledge our commitment to raising awareness about the stewardship of creation"

In November this year, the United Kingdom will be hosting COP26 United Nations conference in Glasgow. Powerful nation leaders throughout the world, attending the conference will be requested to make choices and policies to help bring about a better world and provide a better future for our children and grandchildren.

Province 30 is asking each council to commit to do something (no matter how small) to help save the world from climate change, or from pollution in <u>our</u> planet. No council could ignore organising a an activity, initiative in support of COP26 resolution. Action is needed, and pollution is everywhere. Now is the chance to involve your parish into DOING SOMETHING to save the planet. Taking up cycling, going veggie (even for 2 or 3 days a week), stop buying anything in your supermarket that is wrapped up in plastic. Many Local Councils provide containers for recycling food waste, which in turn will be converted to fuel, other Local Councils provide wheelie bins for your paper, cardboard, plastic, tins & cans. Getting better at knowingly separating waste and recycling can be one way of making a contribution.

Agricultural chemicals and artificial food for our cattle is bringing about decease and destroying our pollinating insects. Few people think about the humble bee, (of which there are over 250 species in the UK), a little insect that helps provide our food, crops, fruit and flowers. Anyone who gardens can plant bee friendly plants in pots or their flowering patch.

The Knights can organise the youth of the parish to walk the streets, parks, recreation areas etc, and provided with bin-liners spend a couple of hours a week just collecting plastic, cans and other polluting items.

If each brother in council drives to the monthly meeting, think about fuel pollution, walk or cycle or better still why don't councils consider ZOOM meetings if not every month, but some of the months to save on fuel, lighting, heating etc. The time set for province and councils to connect and engage with schools and children as suggested by Bro Michael Akinele Director Youth and Young People has now gone, but that does not mean that our

efforts to engage and connect with our youth and community to stop/prevent pollution ends here. Saving the planet from pollution and disaster does not rest with politicians, and manufacturers alone, but the real power is in the hands of each one of us. If we don't buy/use/dispose of things that pollute, if everyone is prepared to sacrifice to reject/do-without, items that produce pollution in their manufacturing, or result in pollution after we finished with them, then one can guarantee that pollution will reduce considerably.

A PRAYER FOR THE COP26 CLIMATE TALKS.

Loving God, we praise your name with all you have created. You are present in the whole universe, and in the smallest of creatures. We acknowledge the responsibilities you have placed upon us as stewards of your creation. May the Holy Spirit inspire all political leaders at COP26 as they seek to embrace the changes needed to foster a more sustainable society. Instil in them the courage and gentleness to implement fairer solutions for the poorest and most vulnerable, and commit their nations to the care of Our Common Home. The death is announced of Bro Des Kelly, one of the stalwarts of Windsor council Co 301 which was subsumed into the Thames Valley Co 984. Born in Kildare on 25th of July 1939, Des had racing blood in his family and reminded us that his house was opposite the starting gate of the Curraugh racecourse.

Small in stature, he fondly remembers the time that



he won a local competition run by the trainer Paddy Prendergast to ride the Derby winner Tulyar through Kildare when he was moving the horse from the trainers stables to the National Stud which was a couple of miles away. Des was a most social person who for many years was active in the community and would think nothing of hopping on his bike after he finished work and cycling to Newmarket from Windsor to see his brother who was a jockey. Des was a great fund raiser and organiser of many events at St Marks church, Windsor. Much of the building of the parish centre was funded by events organised by Des and his team of men. He had useful parish contacts who worked in Windsor Castle and Des often was able to get the Irish Guards that had a barracks nearby to supply manpower or equipment for the annual parish fete. He famously recalled a tank arriving outside the church and the tracks being supported by some eggs to show how light the vehicle was on the ground. Des married wife Phillis in Windsor and had three sons, Paul, David and Mark who live locally. He was proud of his grandchildren who were always dropping in. With Phillis active in the UCM and Des in the KSC they were a good team and were invited to host Mary McAleese, the Irish president who visited the parish during a royal visit. Phillis died several years ago and in recent years Des has not been in good health. He will be fondly missed in the Windsor community. His funeral will be at St Marks church, Windsor on Monday 1st November at midday •

2021 St Edmund Campion Pilgrimage - Lyford Grange Mass

This year Fr Liam Cummins (MHM) of St Edmund Campion Parish, Maidenhead, Fr David O'Sullivan PP from St John Vianney, Wantage and the former Wantage PP Canon Peter Turbitt were the main celebrants for the Mass held in the barn at Lyford Grange Mass on Sunday 26th September 2021 as part of the Covid delayed annual St Edmund Campion Pilgrimage.

Pilgrims assembled at the Anglican village church of St Mary in Lyford about half a mile away, for a short service, the Rosary procession made its way through the country lanes to the Grange for the Mass in the barn over eighty pilgrims commemorating where the Jesuit priest Edmund Campion was captured before being shackled to a cart and dragged through the Thames Valley to London and put on trial. Campion was subsequently hanged, drawn and quartered with Alexander Briant and Ralph Sherwin on 1st December 1581.

A little background on how St Edmund Campion Pilgrimage came about. - In the late 1960's Mgr Hume, Fr Tiger SJ and Fr Woodard of Our Lady of Peace, Burnham decided to organise a pilgrimage with St Edmund Campion's Relic supporting the Canonisation of a group of representative English and Welsh

Roman Catholics who were martyred between 1535 and 1679; they were selected from 200 already beatified by earlier Popes. On 25th October 1970, Pope Paul VI Canonised St Edmund Campion as one of the Forty Martyrs of England and Wales.

After the canonisation of the Martyrs it was decided to carry on this act of worship for Christian Unity and Peace. The Knights of St Columba were asked to organise the annual pilgrimage with the Relic resting at churches overnight following as near as possible the route Campion took on his way from Lyford Grange in Oxfordshire - where he was captured, to Tyburn in London where he



was put to death. The route includes Stonor where there is a priest's hole and Campion famously hid his printing press. This years schedule includes Masses at 44 churches on the route and passes through Portsmouth, Birmingham, Northampton and Westminster Dioceses on its fifty four day journey. The final Mass is at Tyburn Convent on Sunday October 24th at 4.00pm.




Father, Lord of all creation, we praise you with all your creatures and the whole universe that comes forth from the work of Your


