Some councils have organised fund raising, while some others are planning to, hopefully so that we can chalk up another success. We cannot all be doctors and nurses, but we aim to help them to deliver on our behalf by providing the means to do their work.

I wish to congratulate all our councils who have worked so hard to pay off their Head Office and Provincial dues for this 2024/5 term and I can honestly say I am glad that that

job is now over and done with for another seven months. I am confident that some of the councils experiences will help them to start promptly come next April, to avoid the agonising and embarrassing work involved in collecting dues.

Since last issue - Province have held its quarterly officers meeting on the 31st July, followed by the Provincial Committee meetings, four on-line Zoom sessions 12th to 15th August. As many will remember, our province has kept up with the times and moved these meetings on-line to avoid late night travel across London, the inconvenience of being away from home, or rushing to get to the venue after a day's work. As you can see on page 4 of this issue, we have made some progress but still have some way to got before we get all the 19 councils to be represented at each of the four sessions. Committee meetings are key to keeping the councils working well and together in achieving our objectives as Knights of St Columba, and for those councils who are finding problems in attending, I look forward that they will work at doing so by the next round 11th to 14th November.

At the last Action Committee meeting, Councils were scheduled to put forward a bid for the next Provincial Project charity, which would then be shared with all councils to debate and decide which one of the tabled charities they liked best, and follow this up by casting their vote for their preferred charity by the next Provincial Action Committee on 14th November. Several Councils do not meet in August, but by the September council meetings all councils should have information from the charities bids submitted to Province. All GKs and A&W officers need to put this on the council agenda for debate during September and October so they can send in their vote of preferred charity by the November deadline. Bro John Lynn can help with any questions council may have. All council votes are to be sent to the PGK and Provincial Action convener [John Lynn] before the 14th November. The winning charity will be submitted for adoption at the next Provincial Council Meeting which will be on-line on the 14th December.

This is the last issue before Bro Rosario Fichardo, our Region-7 Regional Director will finish his term of office. At the next Supreme Council in Liverpool on 18th October, there will be a change where all current regional directors will be stood down, and just four National Regional Directors elected to cover the country. I thank Bro Rosario for his help and assistance in enabling the amalgamation of three provinces and in his work in taking our issues up with the Supreme Director. I look forward to continuing to work with Rosario who will no doubt fill one of the council officers in Council 163 Hanwell.

Catholic leaders join French Bishops in condemning Last Supper Scene at Paris Olympic opening ceremony.

Bishops and prominent Catholics from around the world have joined the French Bishops' Conference and U.S. bishops in criticizing the Paris Olympics opening ceremony held on July 26 for its depiction of the Last Supper, calling it a deeply deplorable derision of Christianity.

The controversial scene, part of the \$1.5 spectacle to kick off the 2024 Summer Olympics in a rainsoaked French capital on Friday, featured drag queens portraying the apostles and an overweight DJ as Jesus in what appeared to be a part of a fashion show — apparently mocking Leonardo da Vinci's famous painting.

In a statement released Saturday, the French bishops expressed deep regret over "scenes of derision and mockery of Christianity, which we deeply deplore."

"We thank the members of other religious denominations who have expressed their solidarity," the statement on July 27 continued "This morning, we think of all Christians on all continents who have been hurt by the outrage and provocation of certain scenes."

Archbishop Charles Scicluna of Malta and Vatican Official Secretary of the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, said on X-Twitter, he had sent messages to the French Ambassador to Malta, expressing his "distress and great disappointment at the insult to us Christians during the opening ceremony of the Paris 2024 Olympics when a group of drag artists parodied the Last Supper of Jesus." While also encouraging others to write to their French ambassador.

Bishop Andrew Cozzens, chair of the U.S. Bishops' Committee on Evangelization and Catechesis, issued a statement calling on Catholics to respond to the Paris incident with prayer and fasting. Bishop Cozzens wrote, "Jesus experienced his Passion anew Friday night in Paris when his Last Supper was publicly defamed. He added "France and the entire world are saved by the love poured out through the Mass, which came to us through the Last Supper. Inspired by the many martyrs who shed their blood to witness to the truth of the Mass, we will not stand aside and quietly abide as the world mocks our greatest gift from the Lord Jesus"

Fray Nelson Medina, a well-known Colombian Dominican priest with a vast social media apostolate, stated that he "will not watch a single scene from the Olympic Games. How disgusting what they have done mocking the Lord Jesus Christ and his supreme gift of love. And they are cowards: they wouldn't mess with Muhammad."

In response to requests for explanations, Michaël Aloïsio, spokesperson for the Paris 2024 Olympic Organizing Committee, responded on Saturday, July 27, on Franceinfo: "We stand by our decision to push boundaries."

I think that the French organisers got their just deserts – the opening ceremony was a complete farce, at which the media to avoid offending the French called it "different" a flop except for the lighting effect of the Eiffel Tower. As one says the Lord paid back with a torrential rain washout of the whole event, and a polluted River Seine – which made it impossible to run the planned events.

The Annual Remembrance service for deceased brothers has been arranged by Province 41 at Westminster Cathedral on Sunday November 17th at 12:00 mass. Invites will be sent out to all Southern Area provinces to join us.

It is customary that brothers from all the Councils will arrange for some of their brothers to attend the mass, which is open to brothers, their wife and family members. The Supreme Knight and his deputy have been invited and as per last year a number of other board members will also attend.

The Supreme Knight and the Deputy Supreme Knight will be invited to lunch after mass, and brothers are welcome to join in. the Menu and costs are being checked out by the Provincial Social Secretary and will be communicated as soon as possible.

This is a good opportunity to show up our Province, and hopefully we would have completed a combined Remembrance Book to be placed at the foot of the altar on the day. All Councils are urged to put this on your council agendas for the next few months, try and get as many brothers as possible to support the event. Councils are encouraged to bring their banners and collars. Let province know numbers attending the mass and if attending lunch, numbers involved, as soon as possible.



At election time last October when the three provinces were amalgamated, we voted in three District Deputies. Regrettably one has stepped down for personal reasons. He will be replaced when Bro Daniel will be installed at the September Provincial Council meeting Mass.

At the last Provincial Officers meeting, we talked about making the numbers up to a group of four to be able to spread the load whereby each of the nineteen councils could be visited at least once during the year. Visits will be shared with the current provincial officers initially to help spread the load.

Working out a visits schedule is not easy, and to be able to start this up as early as possible, province asked all councils to name couple of dates in the next few months, when a visit will be arranged to match the monthly council meeting. So far one **ONE** council have replied. !

Each council Grand Knight will be given a 'Visits Sheet' of heading that the visiting deputy or provincial officer will be looking at. Following the visit, the District Deputy or Provincial Officer will prepare a summary of observations, for the Council Grand Knight and Province, to where necessary help councils to improve standards and performance.

This is nothing new, but rather a practice set up by the Order years ago, and it was found to be an excellent way to be able to meet the brothers, be able to appreciate the good work and successes of councils, while at the same time working with the Grand Knights to improve on any points that were not at least matching the basic standards required from all councils. •

Councils are required to maintain an Attendance register and a Visits register, which the visiting officer will be interested in.

THE ATTENDANCE REGISTER - a book that enable brothers to sign in as they arrive for council meeting - It will record HOUSEBOUND & SICK as well as a record of brothers that are absent. Details of the register should be recorded in the council minutes.

THE VISITS REGISTER - a book that records who's been visited at home/hospital, when and some feedback from the visit.

WRITTEN REPORTS - Finance - Membership - Spirituality - Action reports to the Council Grand Knight and Council secretary. •



What is the Brown Scapular?

"Our Lady invites everyone to wear the Scapular. ... The reason for this is that the Scapular is our sign of consecration to the Immaculate Heart of Mary." - as recounted by Sr. Lúcia, one of the children of Fátima, who met Our Lady.

Pope St John Paul II who wore the scapular, always insisted that his scapular should never be removed even when he was taken in for surgical procedure.

The Scapular of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel, or Brown Scapular, as its known, consists of two pieces of brown woollen cloths on a cord.

Blessed Mother gave this sacramental to St. Simon Stock in the year 1251 with a promisethat "Whosoever dies clothed in this garment shall not suffer eternal fire," It is a sign of salvation, a sure safeguard in danger, a pledge of peace and my special protection until the end of the ages."

According to the Holy See's *Directory on Popular Piety*, 205 : The history of Marian piety also includes "devotion" to various Scapulars, the most common of which is devotion to the Scapular of Our Lady of Mount Carmel. Its use is truly universal and, undoubtedly, it is one of those pious practices which the Council described as "recommended by the Magisterium throughout the centuries" (Second Vatican Council, *Lumen Gentium*, Chapter VIII).



The Scapular of Mount Carmel is a reduced form of the religious habit of the Order of the Friars of the Blessed Virgin of Mount Carmel. Its use is very diffused and often independent of the life and spirituality of the Carmelite family.

Through this version of the Scapular of the Carmelite Order, those who wear it, associate themselves with the Carmelite Order, both in their devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and their expectation of her protection.



We are now six months - half way - on our way for fundraising for our Provincial Project for the **NORTH LONDON HOSPICE**. It is hoped that councils have had this on their council meeting agenda, every month since March, and have considered and debated the best way of raising your council's contribution to this worthy charity.

The ambitious target set last March was for Province 41 to raise £15000 by the end of March 2025. Working out that we have nineteen councils, and 280 brothers, it does not take a degree in finance to work out that, that works out to £789 per council. Some councils will find that fairly easy to raise in 12-months, while others will throw their hands up in the air and declare that that's is impossible.

The point was made, that the project would be on the monthly council meeting agenda. Some councils have actually done that and talked and planned how they were to raise their money through walks, fairs and all sorts of involving their community to participate. Other councils considered there was plenty of time to raise the money, while others never planned or organised any fundraising at all. I still have phone calls from councils **ASKING ME WHAT THE PROVINCIAL PROJECT** was, so late in the program !!

Fundraising is our way of living our faith. As Jesus said.... "Listen, those who have ears !" while the above message from St Paul... Quote "Each one should give what he has decided in his own mind, not grudgingly or because he is made to, for God loves a cheerful giver." Unquote. The idea *is not* for the brothers to dig into their pockets or rush for their cheque book and find the £5.00 per month, or even to raid their council general account to save their reputation by making a nominal donation at the end of the year. Provincial projects are there initially to fund raise for those less fortunate than us, but the project is also a tool for brothers to work together as a team, organise fundraising events, involve their parish community, advertise the work of the Knights and hopefully recruit one or two members as a bi-product.

There is still six months to go, and the next few months are the time when the weather allows outside events to be run, so please can you get going, the sooner the better.

Advertise for donations as well as run fundraising events, and if you so wish make a monthly donation, but debate and different ideas from the council brothers about how to best to maximise what your council can find towards the overall target.

We all know someone suffering from Cancer or other terminal illness. We cannot all be medical carers, nurses etc, but we can collectively provide the funding that is needed for others to do the work on our behalf. \bullet

During the pilgrimage, there was the occasion to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation and, for those who desired it, the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick.
