Eulogy to Mike Bagness - funeral 11th March 2021

He was a dedicated member of the Knights Of Saint Columba for 46 years, holding many offices locally in Council 243 and in Province 30, as well as a few roles offered by HQ, all of which he accepted willingly and did to the best of his ability. The KSC has provided Dad and Carmel with great friendships over the years and has been a very large and important part of their lives. They met some wonderful people and it has been a loving community, especially in time of need. Dad was always very proud to be part of the Order.

Faith, friends and family were at the centre of Dad's life. He had a strong work ethic. When we were kids he worked every hour he could to keep a roof over our heads and meet our demands for the latest computer console, Cup final tickets, CB radios...or whatever the latest fad happened to be. We never went without, in fact we were spoilt. A 2 week summer holiday was always guaranteed. Butlins in Bognor, or Minehead, it didn't matter where, as long as it was a Butlins we were happy. Successes of other holidays, usually trips to Wales, were judged by miles driven. "How was the holiday Mike?" people would ask "Excellent, we did 350 miles", would be the reply.

Friday nights were spent in St Clarets Club, the adults played bingo and danced, while the kids were sat down with a bottle of coke, a bag of Taytos and 50p for the fruit machine. He loved the church community, Hayes, and the company of friends. He also loved his job working at Silverdale Press, up the road here, off Pump Lane. We used to visit him there on a Saturday morning staring at the piles of fancy Concorde menus they used to print wondering what a *fillet mignon* and *creme brûlée* were. His dedication led him to be offered a managerial position, but he turned it down, preferring the camaraderie of the factory floor. They made him foreman instead which was great, but it meant he was also responsible for security which came with a package of 2am emergency alarm calls. NOT so great. After 30 years he left print behind. Most people would have retired, but not one to put his feet up he instead gained an NVCQ in Admin & IT, he was then employed by the school to teach IT to others. Moving on again, he became Parish Administrator in Botwell for 20 years at the request of his long time friend Father Michael Fewell.

After mum died, Dad's future could have been bleak, but good fortune and with some intervention from Auntie May he was introduced to a young lady named Carmel. He was quickly won over by her sharp intellect and big heart. He was always an excellent judge of character and proposed just six weeks later. We had a new, ever expanding family in the Byrne's, and with the frequent first communions, confirmations, weddings and Christmases in Kilkenny, Dad was in his element.

He quickly formed a bond with Seamus, they became best buddies, two gentlemen sharing glasses of Paddy's, as well as having similar outlooks on life. Dad swapped Butlins for trips to Canada, Peru, Japan, Australia, African safari's, Rome and many more places, including numerous trips to Ireland. The globe was well and truly covered and he always said "do it while you can", and he certainly did.

An Englishman's home is his castle, and Dad put his heart and soul into the family home all his life. With his green fingers, weekends were spent cultivating the flower beds in an eternal quest to create the perfect garden. With the lawn manicured and the tools put away in his shed, he and Carmel would sit and watch the parakeets swoop down to the bird feeder. A peaceful pastime for a peaceful man.

Dad and Carmel made for a winning team and were devoted to each other for 35 years. It was because he had Carmel by his side that he was able to lead such a full life. He would have liked another 10 years, his mind was still sharp, but he had no complaints and packed everything he could into his 82 years.

Carmel cared for Dad in his final days with the same devotion she showed him for the whole of their marriage. He departed this life as he had wished, at home with Carmel holding his hand and his boys by his side.

In an age when children look to celebrities for role models, we only had to travel to Hayes to find ours.

Rest in Peace Mike Bagness, it was a good life well lived.

THE JAM JARS AND THE BACKPACKS

Empathy and feeling sorry for those less fortunate than us is **NOT ENOUGH**.

When at Mass we confess “For what I have done” we also need to remember the next few words.....”**FOR WHAT I HAVE FAILED TO DO**”.

When we look at our screens, see the street, suffering and abandoned children in Malawi, Uganda, Ethiopia, Kenya, South Sudan, Syria, Aden and several other countries, feeling sorry for them is NOT ENOUGH. One cannot claim to be human and not want to do something to help.

We cannot all be missionaries, but we all know what their ministry is all about, we all read how many make it their lifetime aim to help those less fortunate than us, in what one calls ‘the developing nations’.

Well if **we know, we see, we hear**, about what our Lord calls THY NEIGHBOUR, one has to do something. Another set of words that ring in my ear ..Matthew 25: 35-40 “For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me.’ I ask, are these not biblical hints about what we should NOT FAIL TO DO ?



In the coming seven or so months, through the Provincial Projects – Street children Ethiopia and W.O.R.K Project in Kenya, we are being presented with an opportunity. We can of course put our hands in our pocket and shell out a few coins, but we are being asked to **FUND RAISE** for these projects. Of course, some tend to start listing the problems with fundraising in the Covid19 age. There are loads of ways one can raise funds if we really want to try to. The trick is to **find something which requires minimum effort to maximum gain**. As most of us are getting on, energy is not in great abundance, but most of us can claim to have studied at the university of life and can use their initiative to find ways of raising money for these projects.

Council 984 Thames Valley packed over 750 backpacks for Malawi’s Mary’s Meals children. The UGANDA Street children appeal was launched at St Francis in Ascot on behalf of the Comboni Missions. The Ethiopia project was launched at the request of the Sacred Heart parish in Sunningdale, one of our seven parishes within our boundaries. We’ve replaced MISSIO project small cardboard collection boxes with JAM JARS, 200 washed, cleaned, labelled and with the Parish Priest cooperation, distributed to the congregation.

Parish priests can quite rightly, be a little touchy about collections at church, so this way, we are not really fundraising in church. Also people are not pressurised on the spot, they donate according to their circumstances in their own time, with a published end-of-project date for them to plan to.

The Missio project raised around £3000, the follow up project raised £4733 for the street children for Uganda. By this time the jam jars were cleaned and relabelled for the Ethiopia project at a different parish, launched between the lockdowns the project to date over £4900. All this proves that the hardest point of fundraising is the courage and conviction to **start doing something** rather than thinking about all difficulties one can come up against. Remember Fundraising is NOT about money, but its about helping those less fortunate than us.

EDMUND CAMPION PILGRIMAGE

The St Edmund Campion Pilgrimage which normally takes place over a seven week period in June / July is being rescheduled this year due to the Covid lockdown.

With lockdown currently planned to end on 21st June it will take a few weeks for the churches to return to normal and for parishioners to gain the necessary confidence to attend any gatherings. Accordingly, we are going to run the Pilgrimage in the September / October timeframe if everything goes according to plan.

I will publish a provisional schedule for planning purposes but am aware that there are likely to be a number of changes because of conflict with other events - holidays etc.

As the timescale is very much related to the HMG guidelines we will keep the programme under review and will keep you informed of further changes. We hope to produce the Pilgrimage Booklets in early August when progress should be clearer and dates of individual church visits of the relic have been confirmed." An INSPIRATION & A ROLE MODEL

In the 1990s Michael was the Provincial Quiz Master – many an interesting evening Quizzing to find the Province 30 representatives for the National Competition, which they have been known to bring home from time to time. He founded (with Bro Jim Keating) this local provincial newsletter and has been its long time editor since 1994. This newsletter, published every two months since then, has travelled across the UK and to distant lands of USA, Spain, South Africa and Australia, keeping up with news and events from around the Province.

In 2000, with the dawn of the new millennium, came his 25th year and a Silver Jubilee Medal for his efforts. - In 2001 and 2008 he received Special Merit Certificates from the Supreme Knight of the time, for Dedicated Service.

Before that having served his local council well, in many roles, including Secretary (a role he carried on until he died) Training Officer (circa late 1990s), Deputy Grand Knight and Grand Knight, he moved up to Province, where he has recorded minutes and fulfilled the other roles demanded of a Provincial Secretary with due care and attention for many years. He was also a District Deputy and Deputy PGK before becoming Province 30's Provincial Grand Knight for 3 years from 2009-2012, returning in 2013-14 for a further term of office.

He has been the keeper and organiser of The 100 club for many years, which has yielded income for the province and provided many a happy winner with an unexpected 'cheque in the post'.

One of his enduring passions has been for the Roundabout – Province 30 Newsletter.

In Charity, comes Unity and Fraternity to raise funds for deserving causes. He provided support for the local parish, dioceses and cathedrals and pilgrimage sites across the UK. These are among some of the great works carried out over the years.

Having proved his success at producing Roundabout for over 20 years he was asked by HQ to edit the eColumba online publication.

Activities to raise funds have included Sponsored Walks, Race nights, Dogs at Wembley, and many more.

Key dates in the calendar :- Fish and Chip suppers ; Dinner Dances ; Chaplains Dinner ; and more... no ending list..... A Provincial Secretary? .. I would say he could well be called THE ACTION convenor. - An inspiration to all.


